

Culinary Arts: International Foods

Credits: 5 **Hours: 90**

Course Description:

This competency-based course provides students with projectbased learning experiences in the art and science of international food preparation and presentation. Technical instruction includes an orientation, resource management, weights and measures, tools and equipment, safety and sanitation and employability skills. Emphasis is placed on the creation of menus, assembly of ingredients, cooking methods, and presentation techniques for Chinese, French, Italian, Japanese, Mexican and Thai meals. The competencies in this course outline are aligned with the California High School Academic Content Standards and the California Career Technical Education Model Curriculum Standards.

Prerequisites:

Enrollment requires successful completion of another course from the Culinary Arts sequence.

NOTE: For Perkins purposes this course has been designated as a capstone course.

This course cannot be repeated once a student receives a Certificate of Completion.

Competency-based instruction provides immediate and continual repetition and In competency-based education the curriculum, instruction, and assessment share common characteristics based on clearly stated competencies. Curriculum, instruction and assessment in competency-based education are: explicit, known, agreed upon, integrated, performance oriented, and adaptive.
